From Our Minister

reetings North Shore Unitarians, It's been weird, hasn't it? Doing church during a pandemic with a minister new to your pulpit. There are so many of you I was only just beginning to know. It is often the case that due to reflections and newsletters and facilitations that the congregation knows more about the minister's life than the minister knows about all the individual congregants. But this covid situation has amplified that.

When we return to in-person Sundays, my relationship with you will be BOTH two years old AND half a year old. We'll do something about that. Immediately, it is on my list to set up a brown bag "lunch with the minister" on Thursdays. This would be a one-on-one (or two) luncheon, a chance to get to know folks who don't frequently populate my zoom windows. I'm still setting up the mechanism on that, so please be patient and keep your eye on the e-bulletins for updates. I look forward to getting to know you.

The first part of this church year was spent trying to figure out how we hold together as a community in a time of physical distancing. Just like in normal times, it takes intention and opportunity, only more so. To that end we engineered two far-reaching vehicles; the Circles of Light (which you can still join at any time), and the anti-racist reading groups.

If you are a part of either or both of those groups you have been able to enter into thoughtful, vulnerable, bonding spaces with others. These groups continue (Circles of Light thru June, and the anti-racist reading group for however long each group's elected rate of reading carries them). As a side note, I know the Saad book can be hard sometimes, disagreeable at times, and simply challenging at other times. My advice is to stick with it. So much good has come from the discussions in the groups I am in, whether in agreement or argument, that I am convinced the exercise is worthwhile.

In the coming months, I will turn my attention from building containers for community engagement to reflecting on community itself, ours in particular. Primary in that effort will be a review and possible rewrite of our covenant. This will require your thoughtful participation. I will provide some food for thought and framing in some upcoming Sunday reflections. Soon thereafter I will invite you to engage in a few workshops in order to review and possibly rewrite our covenant and raise its profile in our community.

That will need more voices than those coming from faces I frequently see in the teams and committees with whom I often engage. A covenant needs to reflect the entire community and so needs the thoughts of the entire community to generate it. This is important work, critical to our future as a congregation. And because we will be "there" together, it will be fun! It's an opportunity to think in both essential and particular terms in order to produce a set of promises that we can use to bind and guide us. I look forward to seeing you there!

Until then, be well, breathe easy, stretch and give thanks when the opportunity strikes.

As I look forward to 2021, I am filled with *hope*.


Hope – that we will be able to meet again in person very soon.

Braiding Essays Together 1-3 pm every other Friday on Zoom



A Property Committee has sprung into existence after several years of gestation. With members from the Building and Grounds Team, the Beloved Building Task Force, the Finance Committee, a Board

Liaison, project leaders, and the Church Administrator, this committee ensures that the property is properly maintained and safe, recommending upgrades and capital expenditures, getting insurance, establishing budgets and rental rates. A multi-year plan will be developed for these matters. Staff, who we count on to alert us to maintenance needs, and Sunday service teams are the main building users during the pandemic. Thermostat adjustments have been made to accommodate them and reduce heating costs. Kuddles, which now pays 55% of our utilities costs, is functioning at near full capacity. Boiler maintenance was performed in the summer by our usual gas fitter. Ground water drains were inspected and cleared in September, as usual. \sim Brian McConnell

e have appreciated everyone's support as we explore the best way to "do" church digitally. Here is a bird's eye view of what we do:

Our current approach is a combination of live and recorded pieces. Every Sunday, we are in different locations as we start the morning, with most everyone working from their home and usually Rev Ron, Malcolm and the Sunday Service Associate physically at the church. We kick off a Zoom session at 10am to run a test from all locations. Then at 10:30, Ross broadcasts the Zoom session via the <u>church's YouTube channel</u>. We follow a detailed technical Order of Service in which all sections are length. Ross is the director, to the people live at

giving cues to the people live at the church as to when to start.

He uses switching software on the production church laptop to move back and forth between video files, images, and the live reflections from the church building. Since there is a small delay between what happens live and what you see, Malcolm monitors on YouTube to make sure that all is well with no freezing, large gaps, lack of audio, etc. When we get to the Benediction, Erin starts up the Zoom session for the after church chat so we are ready even before the service ends. Every Monday, we meet to do a debrief and to start on a new service.

We are planning for the eventual return to services in the Sanctuary,

labeled as live or recorded, and their length. Ross is the director. optimizing the equipment we have and working with an experienced sound consultant to improve the audio even more.

We are also updating our social media: coming up with a regular publishing schedule for Facebook/ Instagram/the website, pulling together all of the content that we can find into one place in the cloud, starting up a podcast with Rev Ron, and making some major upgrades to the website.

We will always broadcast the services live going forward, and services will always be available to watch at a later time on <u>Youtube</u>, even when we are all back in church able to give each other big hugs in person! If you have questions or comments for us, please write us at:


Children's Program

Lynn Sabourin: A Tribute

If you're having trouble remembering or even imagining a time Lynn Sabourin wasn't part of this church, you're not alone. Consider:

She started this job in 1981. The number one movie that year was *Raiders of the Lost Ark*. And like Indiana Jones, Lynn has basically been one breathless step ahead of that giant rolling boulder ever since. Forty years. Of this. With us. Somewhere in Lynn's heart is a private tally of what that actually means. Like:

- 375 rounds of King Frog
- 55 sleepless nights on the basement floor
- 310 AA batteries procured for flashlight tag
- 1,802 Eggo waffles served
- 3,778 dish clothes washed
- 49 grant applications proofread
- 1,200 off-rhymes finessed
- 812 how-ya-doin? calls to departed former members
- 1510 pinecones hot-glued to boards
- 250 Superman blessings led
- 52 forgotten lines stage-whispered to small people dressed as shepherds or mice
- 4,002 bits of straw picked out of the sanctuary carpet on Christmas Eve
- 75 kilos of raw sewage shoveled out of the basement after a sewer-line break
- 42 database updates completed
- 450 outrageous secrets kept in confidence
- 175 condoms rolled on to bananas
- 87 toilet-paper runs to Costco
- 15 gentle reminders of the "one body one bag" rule for youth at cons
- 76 epiphanies kindled
- 514 fears assuaged
- 64 kids made to laugh while they were drinking juice
- 27 chalice burns
- 13 ministers broken in

The Lost Ark, when Lynn finally found it, was anticlimactic. It just contained glue sticks.

But there's another tally that never made it into Lynn's books. It's the number of lives she changed. Think about how many folks came through these doors just to check out this strange faith. And they met Lynn, and they got it. All seven principles, embodied right there in the Yukon blonde. And they never left.

If it were up to us, Lynn herself would never leave. Ever. We'd bury her bones under the chancel.

She finally had to make the first move and quietly slip out the back of the theatre. She'll forgive us for not getting up, even as the credits roll. We'll just sit in the dark here for a bit.

Feeling sad, feeling grateful.

Mostly grateful.

Since 1999, this program has earned over \$7,000 for the church! If you shop at these stores, put your receipts on the bulletin board in the stairwell. It results in "free money" for the church!



Our Seven Principles

Unitarian Universalist congregations affirm and promote seven Principles, which we hold as strong values and moral guides.

- 1. The inherent worth and dignity of every person;
- 2. Justice, equity and compassion in human relations;
- 3. Acceptance of one another and encouragement to spiritual growth in our congregations;
- 4. A free and responsible search for truth and meaning;
- 5. The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at large;
- 6. The goal of world community with peace, liberty, and justice for all;
- 7. Respect for the interdependent web of all existence of which we are a part.

We will continue to observe the orders of local, provincial, and federal health authorities relating to Covid safety, including suspending in-person meetings and services when required.



Covid-19 Protocols

We ask everyone for complete cooperation in complying with the following protocols while attending services and other in-person events at the church:

- 1. Pre-registration is required for each person attending a church service (including all children and adults).
- 2. Occupancy limits (see article at right) must be observed.
- 3. We will pre-screen each person before they enter the building, asking a few Covid-related questions, and taking everyone's temperature using a non-contact thermometer.
- 4. No one may enter who is sick or experiencing COVID-19 symptoms.
- 5. No one may enter who is in 14-day quarantine or who has been in close contact with someone suspected of having COVID-19.
- 6. Everyone must use hand sanitizer upon entering.
- Please bring your own mask(s). Masks are required in the building for everyone (except the Minister and Service Associate during the Sunday morning services).
- 8. We will track attendance in case contact tracing is necessary later.
- 9. Wind instruments and singing are prohibited. (Humming is allowed).
- 10. Everyone will observe social-distancing, staying at least 2m away from others who are not in their immediate household. (Chairs may be re-arranged so people from the same household can sit together).
- 11. Sanctuary doors will be left open for improved air flow.



COVID-19 Occupancy Limits

Our COVID-19 Safety Plan (see article below) included establishing and posting occupancy limits for the various rooms and spaces in our buildings.

12. Please use washroom at home before attending the service, as our washrooms are limited to one person each.

- 13. There will be no coffee or tea served during or after events.
- 14. The church kitchen is "closed". Please bring with you any food or drink you will need while you're at church.
- 15. Disinfectant spray and paper towels are provided throughout the church building, including the washrooms. Please use these supplies to disinfect commonly-touched surfaces before you handle them.



Our COVID-19 Safety Plan

Our Board and staff developed a COVID-19 Safety Plan, as required by WorkSafe BC and Vancouver Coastal Health. The Plan outlines our policies, guidelines, and procedures to reduce

the risk of COVID-19 transmission at church. Our COVID-19 Safety Plan is available <u>HERE</u> and on our website, and a printed copy is in the foyer. We encourage everyone to continue general recommendations such as frequent hand washing, avoiding contact with shared surfaces, staying home when sick or required to self-isolate, social distancing, wearing a mask when in public places, and avoiding crowded places.
