### From Our Minister

t is time to look forward. Renewal awaits. Renewal, but not repetition. All around us we are finding that the thinking, wisdom, and institutions that got us to this point (accomplishing some truly miraculous things along the way) are increasingly insufficient to needs of the moment and the needs of the future.

Much like the rest of the world (or perhaps, setting an example for the rest of the world), North Shore Unitarian will continue to nurture those timeless practices and perspectives that have been core to us since ancient times, while also evolving them into a form and function that will shake us out of habit and into vibrant life.

This is the work of the world. This is the work of our church. This is your work. We will need every one of you, even if your part of that work is limited to encouragement, support, and the curation of the wisdom gathered in your life. We need that. We need presence coming alive, emerging into the moment.

Big words. How do we do that?

Much like the architect's drawings look grand, they mean nothing without a shovel and mortar. The work may look mundane. But what it builds will grant new insights and ways of being.

Is that the church you want? I hope so.

So what do shovels and mortar look like? Well, it looks like a very full autumn.

It looks like a Province wide leadership development workshop in early October. It looks like researching, refining, and implementing a Vancouver Metro UU (four congregations) cooperative restorative justice process to help one another get back into loving relationship when things go sideways. It looks like deep reflection and discussion in September and October presaging a November vote on the merits of the proposed 8th Principle. It looks like the recentering and rewriting of our congregational covenant. It looks like thinking and feeling deeply about what it means to be a spiritual community. So, so rich. And of course, it looks like a newly configured Sunday morning that leans into the multigenerational wisdom and heart of our congregation. It looks like building toward the future. But none of that even touches on the programming we hope to offer as a congregation. 
of Light and Essay groups will be ongoing and enriching. Three of our Teams will have additional offerings to encourage your cultivation of depth, meaning, and purpose.

### From Our Board President

o paraphrase Joseph Stalin: Death is the solution to all problems —no congregation, no problems.

We at North Shore Unitarian Church are blessed with many problems, which means we're still very much alive. And since we don't want to use Stalin's solution, we'll have to do things the hard way. As President, the church's problems have become my problems, so now I'm making them your problems.

First among them, and from which all others spring, is the simple and inexorable passage of time. Like the 2018 Canucks, we've been carried for years by a core group of veterans that's now approaching retirement (or in fact, second retirement). It's time to rebuild.

For decades, FundFest has been a major fundraiser for the church and the hub of the social calendar. It also hasn't happened in two years, and not merely because of the pandemic. The team which had run it so smoothly for so long had already retired after 2019, and

covid merely provided an additional hurdle to finding replacements.

Our church has been sitting mostly empty and undisturbed since March of last year, like a time capsule from the time before covid, except not old enough to be nostalgic about. It just needs some spring cleaning. Ordinarily, organizing this would be the purview of Buildings & Grounds, but B&G is currently without a chair following the well-earned retirement of Brian McConnell.

Cares & Concerns is also looking for some new blood, to carry out the vital work of bringing the love of the congregation to members who are in hospital or otherwise going through something.

We'll continue streaming church services even when we're back in person, which means we need more people on the Production Team.

And one of my personal projects for the

year will be to revive Neighbourhood Groups, which will require someone to get them up and running.

As you can see, we have a lot of holes in our roster, and while we were able to bring in a free agent to replace Lynn, we're hard up against the salary cap and will have to fill the rest of the holes by promoting from within. But fortunately, we have a deep bench.

Each passing year also brings a fresh crop of retirees with time to fill, a new wave of empty nesters whose children have gone off to university.

This is, as the Simpsons say, a crisatunity. We're changing the way we do church, as a matter of survival. That means we don't have to keep doing things the same way. Meetings don't always have to be in person, and neither does Fund-Fest. There's never been a better time to try something new and think outside the box.

I'm a prime example of how far you can go just by saying yes occasionally (not even half the time!). I've had no leadership training, I'd never chaired a meeting before I joined the Board, never taken min-

utes before I
became Secretary, never
looked at a
strategic plan
before I
agreed to help
write one, and
I'm already too
busy to be
President. If
nothing else, I
want to be a
living rebuttal

to all the usual excuses and prevarications people give when the Nominating Committee comes calling.

It doesn't even have to be you! Think about the work that needs to be done, and who you know in the church who might be good at it, and then rat them out to me or the Nominating Committee. The value of informants is something Stalin and I both agree on.







#### **Environmental Action Team**

Summer is upon us, and the next few months are prime time for North Shore Unitarians to connect with the natural world we are striving to protect. Since your Environmental Action Team was formed in January 2021, we have sponsored six Open Meetings on 4th Wednesday nights on

Zoom. We've heard from guest speakers Dr. John Millar of Force of Nature and Claire McGillivray of the Edible Garden Project. Webinars and essays have inspired our online discussions as well, along with Judith Gordon's "Green Tips of the Month" which also appeared in the Friday eBulletin. Letter-writing alerts to municipal councils have resulted in some victories for measures to combat Climate Change.

This Spring, we've been busy exploring options for reducing the size of the NSUC lawn—putting the suggestion of growing vegetables in raised beds on hold for now and turning instead to creating a proposal for a pollinator-friendly planted area. Our allies in this research are NorthShore Butterfly Rangers from the David Suzuki Foundation. We're always looking for more members of our Core Steering Group to help us prioritize actions and improve our communications to the congregation. Next Fall, we hope to return to meeting in person, but over the summer, join us on Zoom at 7:15 pm on 4th Wednesdays: July 28th and August 25th. Find topics and links in the eBulletin.

They don't call themselves a Church (to the locals, the word "Church" is altogether too reminiscent of the Catholic Church). Nor do they call themselves "Unitarians" (because it looks too much like "Unitarianists", a political party in Argentina after their war of independence).

They are a thriving little group, and I know their founder leader, Lilian Burlando, a lawyer by profession who has attended numerous meetings of the UUA, the CUC and the ICUU. ## The 8<sup>th</sup> Principle

### of UNITARIAN UNIVERSALISM

The population of the North Shore is about 70% white. The percentage of white people in our congregation is much, much higher than that. The CUC's Dismantling Racism Study Group Report shows that we are far from unique. Unitarian congregations in Canada are significantly whiter than their surrounding communities, and have been for most of our history. Our lack of action around anti-racism also has us out of step with our own youth and young adults.

The 8th Principle is not a solution; it is a commitment to identify and address the barriers that push people away from our congregation. We've already set this as a priority, both in the strategic plan and in last summer's social justice survey.

A sub-committee of the Board (Ryan Guenther, Yette Gram, Sonya Wachowski, and Rev Ron) will lead our 8th Principle program, holding Town Halls this Fall to answer questions and discuss the 8th Principle. We will then have a congregational meeting, to direct our delegates on how to vote at the CUC's meeting on November 27th.

John Slattery is leading an 8th Principle Alternate Wording Task Force to gather feedback from the congregation on the currently proposed motion. To be involved, contact John. ~ Ryan Guenther



### **Building & Grounds**

Whether by design, low traffic or by luck, demands on the B&G Team's members and budget have been lower than usual during the

pandemic. Since last summer, when the boiler underwent its first maintenance in decades, only fence repair, fallen tree limb removal, rodent trapping, crash door lock replacements in the Rod Stewart Building have been required. Kuddles handled snow removal work and upgrades to its space. Recording, rendering and streaming services have necessitated some significant video and audio equipment purchases and consulting. This has largely been led by Alison Nixon and used budget lines approved by the Board.

Going forward, these areas need attention:

- continued annual ground water drain lines clearing (\$2-3K),
- painting of some exterior surfaces (up to \$16K without volunteers),
- continued surveillance of large trees for limb loss and potentially, removal (\$8-10K each),
- an expected furnace removal in RSB.
- succession planning for the current B&G Team


### **Spirit Zones for This Fall**
