## Our Board President's Explanation of our New Governance Model

On November 9th, your Board adopted a new "Governance Model", the culmination of more than a year's work by the Task Force on Governance (TF on Governance). What is a "Governance Model" and why did we adopt a new one? This article will try to explain. But first some background.

Background. At our AGM on June 8, 2014, the Congregation approved a comprehensive resolution that, among other things, requested the Task Force on the Future (TF on the Future) to assist the Board in developing a strategic plan to help meet the challenges NSUC will face in the future. The resolution specifically required that in developing the plan the Board and the TF on the Future address a number of im-

portant issues. One of those issues was: "How can we improve our governance model to better support NSUC and its mission and vision?"

In response, the TF on the Future created the TF on Governance - a working group charged with focusing on and answering this issue. Elain Duvall was appointed Chair, and Sanford Osler and Pat Brand became the other members. This special Task Force worked intensely for more than a year: conducting research in governance literature; talking with other UU congregations about their governance practices; and, most importantly, interviewing and consulting with **NSUC** staff and Congregation members, including two town hall meetings.

The result of all that work was the new Governance Model the Board approved at its November 9<sup>th</sup> meeting.

Governance vs. Ministry. Key to understanding the new Model is first to understand the distinction between "Governance" and "Ministry". As applied to NSUC, "Governance" means all the decisions, plans and policies necessary to organize and guide NSUC as an institution with a powerful mission, and to make sure it runs on a sound basis - financially, organizationally, managerially - both now and in the years ahead. This includes many things, from adopting good personnel policies and financial controls, to managing well our physical and financial resources, to wise strategic plan-(Continued on page 3) ning.

"Ministry" on the other hand, can be thought of as everything else — or, more descriptively, everything else we do to carry out our mission of empowering people to live with greater depth, meaning and purpose. This includes everything from Sunday services, religious education, Heart Mind Spirit programs, the music program, to the youth program — all the many things we do to welcome all to our caring community, foster spiritual growth free of dogma, and inspire actions in the service of life.

New Governance Model. With

this distinction in mind, the basic framework of the new Governance Model is this: The Board, which under the Societies Act has total responsibility for managing all the activities and affairs of NSUC, will focus on Governance, and will delegate to the Minister (or, in our case, the Co-Ministers) full authority and responsibility for delivering and administering all of our Ministries.

Our Ministries are grouped into three categories:

"Belong with Heart Ministry" includes the programs, services and activities that attract and

welcome people into our caring NSUC community, show we care about their well being, and make them feel glad to belong here.

"Thrive in Spirit Ministry" includes the programs, services and activities that foster spiritual growth free of dogma, foster thriving in spirit.

"Act in Service Ministry" includes the programs, services and activities that inspire and support people to act in service of life.

Committees & Ministry Teams.

To help the Board carry out its

Governance role, it will rely on a

(continued from page 3) limited number of standing committees or task forces, such as a Governance Committee, Human Resources Committee, Finance Committee, and the Task Force on the Future.


The Co-Ministers, to carry out their role in developing and delivering the Ministries of the church, will rely on and supervise the staff of the church, and, with the staff, will create and work with "Ministry Teams".

Ministry Teams are teams of volunteers that work with the Co-Ministers and staff to assist in developing and delivering all the Ministries of the church. In the past, we've generally called such groups of volunteers "committees." For the new Model, the word "Ministry Team" was intentionally chosen for these volunteer groups, rather than "Committee"

 to emphasize that the purpose and function of these teams is action — the carrying out of


- our mission through our Ministries rather than meetings
- and to help distinguish them from the more policy-oriented standing committees that help the Board with governance.


**Preliminary Chart of the Org** Structure. To help visualize the structure of the new Governance Model, please look at the organizational structure chart (below). But please note, importantly, that this org chart is a preliminary draft, a work in progress. The purpose of the chart is only to initially illustrate how the Governance Model can be visualized as we start to implement it. Only some of the committees, task forces or Ministry teams shown on the chart currently exist with the name indicated, some exist currently but with a different name, and some do not yet exist. And the categorization of any activity or team under one of the three Ministries rather than another is preliminary, and not intended to be definitive.

In approving the new Governance Model at its November meeting, the Board was well aware much needs to be done before the details are worked out and the new system is up and running smoothly. But we are excited. Thanks to the outstanding work of the Task Force on Governance, we have reached an important milestone in doing what the Congregation asked the Board to do at the June 2014 AGM: "improve our governance model to better support NSUC and its mission and vision."





This program facilitates a process of personal reflection, learning, and spiritual growth focused on the topic of death and dying. It is not designed to be a grief support group, nor is it an intellectual study of the topic. The program includes information from the social sciences, theological reflection, personal

and shared narrative, creative expression, journaling, and practical learning. 
#### 3-6 Year Olds

Our **Spirit Play** class has been exploring stories that focus on our principles that they call promises. This past month has included the orange promise-offer fair and kind treatment to all, illustrated by the story of <u>The Lazy Bear</u>. For the yel-

low promise- yearn to accept and learn about ourselves, others and Mystery they heard about <u>Small Fry</u>, a young fish who is shown a way to see the "world beyond the pond" and is influenced by that forever. The green promise-grow by exploring what is true and right in life, looked at the tale of <u>The Empty Pot</u> in which a young boy is rewarded for telling the truth even though the truth was difficult to present to the Emperor.

## 7-8 Year Olds

The Primary Class in the **Moral Tales** program looked at forgiveness via the story of <u>Mussa and Nagib</u>, two friends who learn that there is value in letting go of past hurts and focusing on the kindnesses received from others. In



another story, they explored the idea that if we looked at everyone as if they were "the messiah," everyone would be treated with respect.

One of the parables from the Bible illustrated the Golden Rule, a version of which is found in every world religion.

#### 9-10 Year Olds

The Middle group continue to gather tools for their **Toolbox of Faith**. A paintbrush represented personal expression of our inner life and thoughts. They had opportunities to paint, make body words and create skits using items from a bag. The time was right to discuss the democratic

process, which was represented by chalk. They looked at the pros and cons of various modes including majority voting and consensus making. Dennis Cooper joined us as an adult guide and brought a suitcase full of the tools that were the visual for powerhammers. With



the weather cooperating, we were outside and the kids had a chance to try out various hammers and nails. Then they heard the story of Unitarian minister, Theodore Parker and a group of abolitionists, who used their power to question government authority and defy the Fugitive Slave Law and thus contributed to the anti-slavery cause.



When weather is bad, our main concern is for the safety of our congregants. It is up to individuals to determine whether or not they feel safe coming to church in inclement weather.

On very rare occasions, church services (and other events scheduled that day) may be cancelled due to poor weather conditions. On a Sunday, the decision will be made by 8:00 that morning.

If a Sunday Service is cancelled, we will try to notify the congregation several ways, including:

- Posting a message on our Home page and Blog.
- Emailing church members and friends.
- Changing the message on our phone's answering machine.
- Encouraging "word of mouth" communications.
- If possible, putting a note on the door.

Unforeseen situations may prevent these methods of communication, in which case we will use whatever means we can to notify congregants of the closure.

Church events other than Sunday Services may be cancelled for bad weather at the determination of the event leader. It is the responsibility of the event leader to communicate the cancellation with the participants.
