2023 Stewardship Campaign Begins!

Each Fall, we launch the Stewardship Campaign for the coming year, asking NSUC Members and Friends to pledge their support in the coming year. We ask congregants to estimate the dollar amount that they plan on giving during the 2023 calendar year. We call this a Pledge. You can let us know your pledge one of three ways:

- 1. Fill out the online pledge form.
- 2. Fill out <u>a paper pledge form</u> (available on the foyer table) and return it to the locked box on the foyer table.

When do you pay your pledge? That's up to you. You can pay your 2023 pledge early (i.e. this year) — or anytime next year. The money can be donated in one lump sum, or multiple smaller amounts using a variety of payment methods.

This is a wonderful time to become reflective. What have you learned about yourself? About systems? About each other? About our tradition? I am in constant conversation with these questions myself.

I hope that we are soon able to move toward health together as a congregation. I believe that centering our covenanting process, focusing on the intentional relationship of small group ministry,

This is a great opportunity to meet Rev. Ron, ask questions, or just get to know each other better in a casual setting.




Healthy Relations Team (HeaRT)

Our new Healthy Relations Team (HeaRT) was formed to promote a healthy community by evolving our congregation's relationship with conflict and covenant. We believe conflict can be addressed and resolved constructively, in keeping with our <u>UU Principles</u>, through direct, honest, and caring communication in an atmosphere of openness, trust and respect.

HeaRT is committed to the safety and wellbeing of all of our members, friends, and guests. Their work will include education, training, prevention; attending to trauma and impact; addressing conflicts through various means, following the Covenant of Healthy Relations; leadership and modeling. HeaRT will identify resources externally and internally to support healthy communication, conflict resolution, restorative practices and healing. They will work to center our covenant in how we do things, supporting the healing of trauma at the individual and collective levels. And they will offer support to members who experienced or witnessed harm by another member or members.

HeaRT plans to offer a Spirit Zone activity once a month on conflict, communication, deep listening and healing practices. Watch for these sessions in the coming months.

n the last few weeks, two serendipitous and separate things happened. They both reinforced what I have felt instinctively about my work and the work of congregations. The first thing is that I attended a professional development workshop called Dimensions of Faith Formation. The second was the most recent newsletter email from Matt Meyer regarding his congregation's governance philosophy. Each of these delivered three straightforward statements that have profound implications for how I will be moving forward with religious education and congregational life this year and into the future.

From my participation in the Renaissance Module (personal development for religious educators) I took away these three points:

- Faith formation is all we do
- Unitarian Universalism is what we teach
- The congregation is the curriculum

What do these statements mean for me, my work and my philosophy of religious education? They mean that whatever we do as a congregation teaches us about Unitarian Universalism and how to be

From Your Director of Congregational Life: What We Do Is Who We Are

Unitarian Universalists in our daily lives. All of what we do is religious education - the liturgy of our Sunday services, the organizations we give our money to, the injustices we choose to protest, the systems we choose to dismantle, the stories we tell ourselves and our youngsters. What we do is who we are.

Matt Meyer is a young(ish) itinerant preacher and percussionist based in Boston. He founded a new and vibrant UU community there called Sanctuary Boston. He has an email newsletter, to which I subscribe. In the most recent one he discussed the governance structure and philosophy of Sanctuary Boston. Again, with three concise points:

- No volunteering without joy
- No programs without leaders
- No committees without purpose

These points helped me put my congregational life work into focus. I want folks to be enthusiastic about volunteering and serving the congregation. It may not be super awesome fun all the time, but I want folks to be doing work they feel called to. I want people to be doing work that is meaningful and spirit filling.

There will likely be fewer programs and events this year, or perhaps just different ones, to make room for what moves folks to create. If you're interested and excited about leading a Spirit

Zone or a spiritual development program, awesome! I'm here to support that! I'm looking for a few folks to make the teams to support various areas of congregational life. Their work will be purpose and mission driven. Their work will be to create and execute programs they're excited about and to support others' enthusiasm.

What we do is who we are.

I'm looking forward to a year in which we learn from one another and grow into solid relationships with each other and Unitarian Universalism.


This will be a challenging year; a year of change and growth and uncertainty. A year like every year before and unlike any we've encountered to date. I am a bit of a weirdo in that I thrive in uncertainty. I love putting wheels in motion without knowing exactly what will occur. The trick, for me, to feel comfortable with change and uncertainty is trust - trusting that I've prepared as best I can, trusting that the folks who are with me are working towards the same ultimate apals.

Building the foundation of my religious education and congregational life work on the abovementioned six points is the best way for me to prepare. I trust that we will find amazing and beautiful and unexpected delights on the other side of this year's uncertainty. I believe that what we do is who we are. I'm excited to see who we become.

Outreach


Each Sunday, 100% of our offering plate collections, unless otherwise marked, are given to the Outreach Recipient.

Updates on our Butterfly Garden









ur Butterfly Garden project was a handson, multigenerational project. We altered a portion of our lawn to create a butterfly and bee-friendly garden as a part of the David Suzuki Butterfly Garden Project. With the support of the NSUC Board & congregants, and the teaching I received from the Dr. David Suzuki Foundation, we have created a full, blossoming garden. We laid down cardboard in early October 2021, and brought in soil to help it compost. Planting was done during the rainy May 15th weekend by a throng of wet and happy people of all ages.

The cool spring lasting through mid July helped root development so that when the sun finally shone in earnest, plants grew with enthusiasm. Daycare attendees watched with fascination as pollinators went to work on the yarrow, sage, thyme and wild strawberries. With a range of blooming times, pollinators had something to feed on from cool spring into our unseasonable warm fall. Growing in this soil was not an issue, but tackling the many tiny red alder sprouts which inserted themselves everywhere required constant weeding.

Overall, the garden was a beautiful addition to the lawn area. It attracted many pollinators in bees, wasps, hoverflies and some butterflies, mostly Cabbage Whites. One Western Tiger Swallowtail was noted. As the winter arrives we will cease our watering and allow the plants to die back

with little clipping. Undisturbed, we hope a place for eggs and larva is provided so that next year we will see more butterflies throughout our season.
