# Children's Program

t's been a very hot summer and one that almost forces you to slow down and take it easy.

That has not stopped Janni,
Joan Cox and me from gearing up and getting ready for our families to return this fall.

Here's what you can expect this fall from the Children's Program.



#### Spirit Play (3-6 Year Olds)

Who am I?
Where did I come from?
What is my purpose?
What are my gifts?
How do I choose to live my life?
What happens when I die?
Why am I lonely and sad sometimes?



These are some of the themes and questions we explore each week in this wonderful program.

Each week a story is presented using manipulative materials. Wondering questions are posed for the children to consider. Following this they are free to choose their "work": either an art activity to respond to the story or to re-tell a story themselves. The weekly story and its related materials are stored in baskets and will be available to the children. The teacher becomes a guide rather than a leader, creating a safe and sacred space for children to make meaning of their lives. Spirit Play takes into account the importance of the creative aspect of play. Deep play is how children learn everything that is important to them. The possibilities are exciting!



# Primary Group (7-8 Year Olds)

The theme of *Treasure Hunting* was chosen to involve children in the excitement of the search for meaning in life at the concrete level of their understanding.

Each week, through games, crafts, songs and stories, the children explore the meaning behind a Unitarian Universalist (UU) principle or value. Central to the curriculum is the class treasure chest and each child's treasure chest which they make to take home. Every week the children make or receive an object to put in their chests symbolic of that week's principle. Similarly, an object goes into the class treasure chest as a reminder of each session. Some of the treasures to be discovered include:

- the importance of each person
- the power of feelings
- the joy of friendship
- the excitement of the search for truth
- stories of our UU heritage
- the interdependence of people and the fragile harmony of nature.

We hope to inspire a gentle way of knowing as it is only with eyes informed by love and respect that we find life's treasures.

# **Children's Program**



## Middle Group (9-10 Year Olds)

Toolbox of Faith (a Tapestry of Faith module) uses duct tape to symbolize flexibility, a hammer for power, a seashell for listening and more. Unpacking symbolic tools of our faith, children experience and develop their relationships with key qualities that shape

UU identity, faith, and a personal call to action. Following each Sunday's session, an email Taking It Home is sent to parents describing what happened in the class and containing ideas for how the experiences can be extended at home.

# Intermediate Group (11-12 Year Olds)

This group has a program called Inquiring Souls that is uniquely theirs, one that is now in its fourth year. Leaders, Jessica Motherwell and Bill Richardson, will create the program with the participants as



they explore answers to their burning questions. Each week one of the kids' questions is brainstormed and, as they do, a number of the kids create a large graphic of their findings. A combination of drawings and words summarize the discussion and remains as a reminder of their exploration. It is an exciting and creative process!



## **Gift-Making Workshop**

On Sunday, November 25th we will have our annual Christmas Gift-Makina Workshop downstairs at the church from 2 -5 pm. Children over 5 years of age will have the opportunity to make gifts for their friends and family. There will be 10-12 craft tables each set up with 2 adults or youth who will show the children how to make each project. The cost of each craft ranges from 25 cents to \$3 and is designed to cover the expense of materials only. Admission is a toonie and includes hot apple cider and goodies.

really love summer. I love the warm weather and picking blackberries and wearing sandals and getting out for a cool ocean swim on a hot afternoon. So I'm always just a little bit wistful at this time of year as the weather starts to change and cooler days and longer nights approach. At the same time, as much as I don't relish the shift in season, I love this time of year as a time of newness and possibility; of starting again with new challenges and experiences.

For me, even though I haven't been a student for almost a decade, September is still the true start of the "New Year" and I always feel a sense of excitement and anticipation at this time.

And so too it is with this year and I will admit I'm especially excited for this year's Youth Program. At the end of June our Youth made a bold decision - to try an experiment with when Youth Group meets, to see if that might serve our Youth community better. So starting this Fall, Youth Group will alternate between meeting on Sunday evenings, as has been done for many years, and meeting on Sunday mornings, at the same time as the Service and Children's RE Classes. We don't know what will happen - if making this change will allow more youth to better participate in our Youth community or not. We just don't know and it takes courage and vision to lean into that uncertainty and try something new and different.

This is one of several reasons why I'm so excited for this fall. The second thing is that in November we will host a Youth Chaplain Training Weekend and Youth and adult Advisors from all across BC, Washington, Oregon and beyond are invited to participate. Youth Chaplains (not to be confused with Lay Chaplains) are youth (and adults) who receive specific training to provide supportive, active listening to other Youth while at Youth Conferences, It is a tremendous skill set to receive training in and is applicable in all kinds of settings from school to family and of course church life.

Lastly, we are running our Coming of Age program again this year with participation from Youth (and mentors) from other UU congregations from the Metro Vancouver area (most likely, several youth from Beacon joining us and hopefully a few from the Unitarian Church of Vancouver as well). This kind of reaching out and partnering with our nearby UU community is so enriching and it will allow more young people the opportunity to participate in a meaningful program that is becoming harder and harder for one congregation to offer all on its own.

In each of these things I've mentioned, there is a spirit of openness connecting them all. Openness to connecting with our wider UU community, to being host, to learning new skills and lastly to being open to the unknown. I can't think of a better way to begin again with you all this September.

## Theologians Café at the West Vancouver Seniors' Centre

Again this Fall, John Slattery is offering a series of monthly Theologians' Café discussions at 2pm at the West Vancouver Seniors' Centre. The upcoming dates and themes are:

#### September 27th Science and Religion.

Rapid progress in the development of artificial intelligence, genetic engineering, the workings of the human brain and many other fields raise serious ethical questions that religious people (and non-religious people for that matter) are struggling to come to terms with. Some developments even seem to strike at the very foundations of the religious experience itself. Is our technology out pacing our ability to cope with it all?

October 25<sup>th</sup> Human Suffering. Why do bad things happen to good people? What are the causes of human suffering? And to ask the great classical question: why does a loving and compassionate God permit human suffering in the first place? Is it to make a point? A punishment for bad behaviour? A test of some sort? Religions have struggled with these questions almost forever. (Think of the book of Job in the Hebrew Bible.) How good are their answers, in your opinion?

**November 22nd God Revisited.** Images of the Old Testament God of wrath and punishment (except for the saintly few) seem quaintly old fashioned now – on a par with the Old Man with the long white beard surrounded by adoring angels. But the God of Love filled with compassion for all may not fit comfortably with many people today either. Whether we are believers of not, all of us carry around some ideas or feelings (positive or negative) about what God is supposed to be. Let's compare notes.

In addition to his work as a composer, he is an active choral conductor and worship leader, and an advocate for using music as a means of creating community in multi-faith, multi-cultural environments.



While the Ministerial Search Committee (MSC) has mostly hibernated over the summer, we are now waking up to a busy schedule.

Sue Forbes has been negotiating "neutral-pulpit" spaces where the MSC can meet prospective candidates. This was a key summer task and we are grateful to Sue.

The MSC will hold a week-end planning retreat with a UUA facilitator over the last weekend of August. This is our time to fully comprehend our task, assign roles, and build camaraderie.

We decided in the Spring, shortly after being appointed, to defer a congregational survey until the Fall. So watch for your opportunity to fill out the survey. There will be both on-line and hard-copy opportunities to give us your opinions. The survey will provide us with both congregational statistics for prospective candidates, and with your quidance for our search.

While we are mindful of our challenges, we are also aware of the opportunity we offer to serve a congregation with the energy, future plans, new building prospects, and momentum left by our previous co-ministers.

May our optimism bring the results we all want.

Custodial changes, B&G Team transition, state of the building, and tenant relations are the focus of this Fall Newsletter.

The Board has taken on a contract with UniClean to do a weekly cleaning of the main



building and the shared parts of the Rod Stewart building. With slightly reduced hours, Tom Fullerton will continue to mow the lawns and provide light landscaping work, as well as Sanctuary tidying and spot cleaning.

After many years of fixing, replacing, cleaning, clipping, painting and building, several B&G volunteers have clearly expressed the intention to move on. Janni may be able to take on some of management issues, but increasingly, professionals will do what these dedicated members have been doing, with predictable cost increases.

The building is dry and warm when needed, with functioning appliances and devices, but in need of some serious renovations: carpet, exterior paint, and more pew replacements, for example. Most of these are being put off in anticipation of our move to new facilities. We continue to use 3 times our water usage before 2017, despite repairs to toilets. Investigations continue. Gail Lehman spearheaded the purchase of a new coffee maker for the youth area.

Our tenant, Kuddles, now has a very active Day Care business going in the former Montessori building and large parts of the Rod Stewart Building. This results in much more wear and tear on the building and grounds, some for which we are responsible (plumbing, kitchen counters, dishwasher repair, roof, etc.) Other repairs, maintenance and improvements have been undertaken by them (painting of RSB hallways, sod replacement, fencing). Talks are underway regarding the paid use of our kitchen for daycare childrens' lunch preparation, but no decision has been made yet.
