From Our Co-Ministers

t is hard to believe that we are heading towards the end of our first year serving as your ministers. In some ways it feels as though we just moved here last week, and in others, like we've known you all our lives. As spring surrounds us now in full swing and attentions turn toward summertime plans, we will be reflecting on the theme of *Blessing* this month.

As we start to reflect, we have been counting some of the many blessings we've experienced with you this year. We were doubly blessed by the beautiful celebration in March of the 50th anniversary of the congregation and our installation. We've been soaking in the spirit of renewal in our sanctuary with the stunning pulpit and chancel tables built by Barrie Forbes, the very successful fundraising for a visual projection system which will be installed over the next several weeks, and plans for further changes to maximize our functional seating and ensure families with young children feel welcome throughout our services. With music and laughter, stories and silence, looking back in reverence and forward with passion—it has been a year of many blessings.

We are hosting a major event in May that we hope you will consider attending. It's our **Startup Workshop**, a traditional event in the first year of ministry for UU congregations, and you can find the details on the front page of this newsletter. Hope to see you there!

This month we will send the choir with our blessings on their way as they travel, along with our Director of Lifespan Learning, Lynn Sabourin, to visit our Transylvanian part-

ner church in Hódmezovásárhely, Hungary. They bring with them the blessing of the financial gifts we collected in March, and celebrate decades of connection between our congregations as the minister of the Hódmezovásárhely congregation retires.

This month also marks major moments in the denominational life of our tradition. The Canadian Unitarian Council Annual General Meeting takes place May 13th in Toronto and across the country virtually. Talk to us if you are interested in participating, or find more information here. This is the first AGM to take place detached from a larger conference, which is now on an every other year schedule. Next year's conference will be held in Hamilton, ON. The Unitarian Universalist Association, with whom we remain affiliated, prepares to meet for its General Assembly in June. This spring, an important conversation about race and leadership has been lifted up in the UUA. As Unitarian Universalists of color have raised concerns about hiring practices that miss the mark on our values of multiculturalism and anti-racism, three UUA leaders, including President Peter Morales, have resigned ahead of elections at the June GA. Read more at the UU World. We are hopeful that the current conversations will lead to a more powerful commitment to being the people and the institution our values call us to become.

Over the next several weeks we will be wrapping up **Hopes and Histories**, our listening circles we have been engaged with since January. If you have not yet attended a circle and you would



like to share your stories and your vision for the future of the church, please contact a host to RSVP. We are planning one additional gathering on Sunday, May 28th, after the service with childcare provided, especially to encourage families to share your thoughts with us. We will report back with an initial report in June as part of the summer newsletter, and will continue to reflect on these conversations over the summer as we plan and prepare for the future.



From the Board President

ell here we are in May already.
Wow, has the year flown by! And what a whirlwind of a

year it's been at NSUC.

So, with the last meeting of this year's Board coming up on May 10th, and a new Board to be elected at the AGM on June 11th, I'll use this last of my President's columns to look back and reflect a bit on this past church year, and on some of the many good things that have happened since August.

August, of course — when Revs. Emily and Marcus started their Co-Ministry with us — is when things started to happen, and happen fast. Immediately came some very visible, obvious changes, like the decluttering of our foyer, and, on Sunday mornings, the opening wide of both front doors, with our two new Minsters standing there to greet us warmly as we walked in.

And soon came other, more profound changes: Sunday services carefully crafted, flowing smoothly, energetic and inspiring. Sermons delivered from the heart that touched us, gave us something to remember and think about the following week, made us look forward with enthusiasm to what the next Sunday would bring. And as one successful Sunday service followed after another, reliably week after week, a clear realization that the congregation in calling these two young Co-Ministers to be our settled ministers had hit a real home run.

Meanwhile, all kinds of other improvements kept being made. Some very visible and obvious:

- An upgraded sound system -all our microphones replaced or fixed and a professional sound board installed in the sound room.
- A brand new, more modern pulpit, hand crafted from the oak of a former pew, and matching chalice tables.
- A fully redesigned and improved website.

And many other improvements and accomplishments throughout the year – less visible or obvious perhaps, but equally or even more important to our success as a well run church and thriving congregation. Listing them all would be impossible, but here are some:

- A new Governance Model, revising the way we govern ourselves and deliver the ministries of our mission.
- New Bylaws complying with the new Society Act.
- A wonderful event installing our new Ministers and celebrating the 50th anniversary of our founding.
- A thriving music program, including a new children's choir, and the organizing of another choir tour to Hungary and Transylvania.
- New ideas and ways for welcoming people to NSUC developed by the Connections Team, including the offering of Starting Point classes and clarifying the path to membership.
- Seven new members joining in March, with the possibility of more new members joining in May or June.

- A successful Canvass hitting our operational funding target.

- Successfully raising funds to acquire an image projection system for the sanctuary which hopefully will be installed in June.

I am deeply grateful to all of you, and honoured to have been your President. Thank you.


Unitarian Children's Spring Adventure

encouraged to think for themselves and to use their imaginations and creativity. In an age where it was often thought that "children should be seen and not heard," this was a radical thought. We can thank Joseph Priestly, an early Unitarian minister, for discovering oxygen, carbonation, erasers and other inventions and for starting the first Unitarian church in the U.S. Vilhjalmar Stefanssen was an Arctic explorer who learned how to live in an extremely cold environment from the Inuit who were native to that part of the world. His respect for their knowledge and culture is a still model for our times.



The Middle Group is learning about the positive uses of power in their Sing to the Power program. In the power of listening activities, they enthusiastically learned that when you are helping people, it is wise to listen to what is needed and not just assume what is needed. In the power to shine, the children heard a true story of two boys who responded to a younger boy being bullied for wearing a pink shirt by organizing all the students in the school to wear pink, as an expression of support. In the power of passion, they heard the true story of the Salwen family who, at the urging of their teenage daughter, Hannah, sold their mansion, bought a smaller house with half the proceeds, and donated the other half to an organization the family chose together with great care and deliberation.





11-12 Year Olds

Our Inquiring Souls covered a troubling topic with their questions: Will humans become extinct? and Would our world be better without humans? The following Sunday they went upstairs to Guy Dauncey's service entitled Journey to the Future: a Hopeful Story for a Troubling Time. Following his talk they debriefed a bit in their class. Two weeks later, Rev. Marcus joined Jessica, Bill and the class to further address this and to put a spiritual lens on the whole issue. On a lighter note, they also looked at Why do we celebrate Spring?

Building & Grounds

Because of an anonymous donation and successful fund raising, the Board was able to approve the installation of a large image projection system in the sanctuary. While the contractor will ensure the connection of all components, B&G members will be

doing some preparatory work. This setup should help us live our mission statement within the community and may be helpful in attracting interest in our building from the larger community. We aim to have it in place for the AGM in early June.

We are also pleased to inform you that sound amplification in the Fellowship Room using wireless microphones is now available for events there like Heart Mind Spirit and FUNdFEST. Our Loop for the hearing impaired also works there.

In March and April, these tasks were done: Barrie Forbes completed the attractive chalice stands to match the equally beautiful pulpit. Mark Mayall and I did our best to discourage flickers away from the upper reaches of our building with metal screening. (We could learn something from them about advertising and persistence!) Mark mounted on a bracket in the Fellowship Room for a large gong formerly used in the sanctuary. We drained rain water from roofs. John Biasucci and I removed some significant blow down debris on Mathers from trees on our property. Thanks to Diane Noble for the heads-up. I once again bled the radiators in staff offices. Bob Vaughan resolved a problem with the safe's keypad. A Monday night renter has been found for the Fellowship Room, starting in the fall. They will be installing a cabinet and a screen, the latter usable by us as well.

Outreach/ Inreach

In March, we collected \$2,203.90 for our Partner Church during Sunday morning offerings, and \$1,236.83 at our Anniversary/Installation event, totaling \$3,440.73. The other half of our Anniversary/Installation collection (\$1,236.83) was given to The Living Tradition Fund, which assists UU Ministerial students with school tuition and loans.

In May, 50% of our Outreach/Inreach collections will be given to McLaren Housing, which provides rental assistance for low income people living with Aids. Please make cheques payable to NSUC.

Grocery Receipt Program

Many years ago, Marie Bensley began a Grocery Receipt fundraiser program at NSUC that was handed over to Nora Coates in 1999. Since then, this program has raised over \$4,700 for NSUC, according to Nora. Here's how:

We've made arrangements with various local grocery stores over the years (currently, the **IGA on Dundarave** and the **Loblaws City Market** at Park Royal). We collect grocery receipts from these stores, gather them together until they total \$5,000, and then trade them in to the store in exchange for a gift card. The IGA gives us a \$20 gift card for every \$5,000 in sales — and Loblaws City Market gives us a \$50 gift card!

Please save your receipts from these stores, and bring them to the specially marked envelope on the bulletin board in our stairwell. You're turning grocery receipts into free money for the church!
