ello to you, dear reader. I hope your day is going well. What a blessing it is to sense the world in the ways that we are able. Whether you want to magnify a good day or rectify a bad one, I have found that drawing attention with one of those miraculous senses to something within my perceptive field and finding the beauty in that something — light on leaves, the sound of rain, a bird call, the footsteps of a pet — works wonders.

It's a question of focus. It's always a question of focus. I wonder, what are you focusing on in your life? What are you focusing on in the congregation? Is it too obvious to say that what you focus on is what you will perceive? Obvious. But true. And worth remembering.

I'm excited about a shift in my own focus that I hope to make next year. I will be focusing more on facilitating small group spiritual practice. My present thinking, subject to evolution, is that we will invite you — YOU — to attend a group of 6-12 participants facili-

tated by Laura or myself once a month. We will offer these a couple of nights and days a week, and perhaps once online a month. For these circles, being in person is important.

As a participant, you will have a regularly occurring engagement once a month. Each engagement would ideally include a heart opening experience, a cup of tea, and a period of shared reflection. Sounds a bit mundane, I know. But I hope the experiences will be both simple and profound, both challenging and affirming.

Of absolute importance will be a process of formal intention setting by each participant. I was recently privileged to be reminded of the power of formal intention setting in the container of supportive community. It's straight up magic.

That intention creates a lens. It almost manufactures its own vocabulary and metaphorical medium of understanding self and world. It can get pretty woo woo in the best way. I guess it, too, is a matter of focus.

My experiences in such settings have been some of the most profound and moving of my life. Sharing those experiences in a group amplifies the encounter. Feeling the support of others and hearing of their own experiences is truly a heart-opening event. It can be beautiful, momentous, and loving.

There remain a number of details to be worked out. I will speak to this more in September when we will begin to populate the groups. In the end we will create experiences together that put us more in touch with our souls, the world, and deepen relationships with each other.

Would you be interested? My hope is to entice 40-80 of you onto this path. Can you imagine the ripple effect that 40-80 people moving through spiritually profound, heart-opening practice would have on our community? On our locality? On our selves? On the world?

Hmmm.

Well, until then, have a great summer. I look forward to moving into even greater depth, meaning, and purpose with you in the fall.

Community Dialogue

Second Community Dialogue Meeting Saturday, June 25th

About 90 people attended our Community Dialogue session on June 11th. An outside facilitator, Kathryn Thomson, led us in four rounds of questions:

Round 1: What is at the heart of this community? What do you value most about it? What brought you here? What has nourished you here?

Round 2: What currently is going well at NSUC? What do we want to nurture and continue to cultivate about what we do and how we behave as a community?

Rounds 3 & 4: What are some things that are not working right now? What needs clarifying, tending to, restoration or change?

Participants shared their responses in small groups, and had opportunity to mingle and hear the perspectives of others.

We will meet again on June 25th (time to be announced) for a second facilitation session. Watch the eBulletin for additional information.

From our Director of Congregational Life



What is Laura's Job?

It's still evolving, but essentially, my role is to manage, plan and organize various aspects of the congregation's life. I manage all the things that happen on Sunday after or outside of the service: children's milestones & snack, Spirit Zones, coffee & bagels and youth group. I stock our Wonderdome

(activity area in the Sanctuary) with colouring materials, fidgets, books, quiet toys and activities. I work with great volunteers to create and organize whole congregation activities outside of Sunday mornings such as the Hallowe'en party, the Gift-Making workshop and the church's 55th Birthday Party. I also help with Starting Point.

I work with Rev. Ron to create spiritual development programs for everyone, like our Wholly, Holey, Holy Days and Donut Communions. I'm looking forward to developing programs for our elders and other spirituality development opportunities for adults in partnership with the Heart, Mind, Spirit Team.

I support the Youth Program Support Team and our Youth Advisors in all the work they do for our young people. I also support our families with a monthly Soulful Home Circle (a drop-in Spirit Zone where those who have youngsters in their lives can connect and chat about what it means to be a UU and a caregiver).

I work with our liturgical team (Rev. Ron, Alison, Sunday Services Associates and the production folks) to include multigenerational pieces on many Sunday mornings. This year, I was involved in the All Hallows and Winter Solstice services. Our Flower Communion pageant, which was written and directed by three of our youth, will be presented June 26th.

As the congregation's Religious Educator, I provide opportunities to learn and grow mentally, emotionally and spiritually with Spirit Zones and other programs that engage participants in learning about the world (e.g. butterfly garden, social justice work), our UU traditions (e.g. Spirit Play, Starting Point), each other and themselves (e.g. meditation, discussion groups). I look forward to creating more of these opportunities in the future.

I have big ideas about Our Whole Lives sexuality education, multigenerational spirituality development programs, and fun with our UU Sources. I hope you have big ideas for this congregation, too.

My role is, in essence, to ensure that this congregation is vibrant and lively, and that it serves all generations and remains true to our principles and values. I look forward to building community and deepening connections with and for this congregation.

From a Youth Advisor

Working with youth is an absolute privilege and pleasure ... 90% of the time. The other 10% is a pain in the butt. But that's only because ... the truth hurts.

Here's the thing about youth: they have a bloodhound's nose for hypocrisy. If we adults aren't walking our talk, they'll call us on it. If we aren't living our values — values we ourselves drew up — they'll go, "What. Are. You. Doing? How are you making this the kind church we'd ever want to keep coming to — let alone bring our own kids to?" That is their gift to us.

The job of a youth advisor (Mark Yaconelli's definition, which I like) boils down to: "loving them into loving themselves." But it works both ways, right? We adults have factory defects, too, and a lot of times it's the youth who are doing the ministering to us.

Here's an example: Kit and I were at CanUUdle a couple of weeks ago with five of our youth. On the last night there was a talent show. I performed a magic trick that totally went sideways. It just didn't work. A little cloud of humiliation followed me back to my seat. Afterwards, independently, two of our youth came up to me and quietly put an arm around me. The first one said: "Don't worry, you'll get it next time!" The other one didn't say anything at all - just left their arm clamped on. That is ministry, right there.

Congregation, here's what I'm really here to say to you about our youth – all of them: We need these guys. We need them to remind us

not to use the word "guys" like I just did, talking about a mixed group. We need their energy, their idealism, their humour. We need them to remind us that LOL doesn't mean "lots of love" – so don't write that at the end of your text message when you're trying to be earnest and sincere.

We need them to remind us that cynicism is not okay. Cynicism about the future amounts to giving up ... And we have no right to be that selfish. That's like walking out of the restaurant when we're done eating, but they aren't, and now we've stuck them with the cheque.

I promise you we will not do that to you. We're staying at the table until they start flashing the lights and turning over the chairs.

Parents ... thank you for sharing these wonderful young people with us. These pains in the butt, these stealth educators, these holy human prototypes. And to the youth, thank you for letting us advisers in ... to your lives. You're the best.

Updates on Our Butterfly Garden

Planted mid-May and nourished by good soil and spring rains, our Butterflyway garden is growing nicely. The Pacific Bleeding Heart and Red Columbine are blooming, and although butterflies have not yet appeared, we have native bees capitalizing on our soil and enjoying the flowers. Most of our 500 species of BC bees live in the ground. They do not make honey but are effective pollinators for our native flowers.

We will have help monitoring our garden this year. Sophia Fan, a UBC student working on her M.S. in Zoology, will visit bimonthly to observe and track the various species of pollinators attracted to our plants. She will report on her findings next Fall.

Our timed watering system is ready to use during drier spells this summer. We still need volunteers to help with light weeding and general maintenance. If you come to NSUC for meetings over the summer, could you help? If the ground looks dry or the plants are wilted, please call Stuart Browning (phone number in Breeze) or let Janni in the office know.

Justice Equity Diversity & Inclusion (JEDI) Team



As Year 1 of our experiment in intergenerational worship (AKA "Spirit Zones") comes to an end, the JEDI team looks back at what we accomplished this year and ahead at what we hope to do during the next church year.

To assist JEDI in our planning for next year, we hosted a Spirit Zone "Open House". We were

gratified that so many of you chose to join us. Your feedback confirmed that we are on the right track. Some of the topics of interest that came up during the round robin were:

- Supporting the local Indigenous communities with their advocacy efforts (https://twnsacredtrust.ca/)
- Supporting the Indigenous Land Back movement (https://
 Iandback.org/ and https://davidsuzuki.org/what-you-can-do/what-is-land-back/).
- Attracting a more diverse demographic to our congregation.
- Publicizing some of the more general interest Sunday services to the wider community.
- Exploring the interrelationships between all the social and environmental justice issues raised and the need to change our economic system to solve inequity and environmental degradation.

JEDI will continue to advocate for Indigenous rights, and as part of embodying our 8th Principle will also focus on how we as a congregation can "widen our welcome" and practice "deep hospitality" to make everyone feel at home in our faith com-

munity and our wider community. We will invite you to Spirit Rooms starting in the fall, to help us explore these topics. This is, indeed, spiritual work.

A JEDI Review of the 2021-2022 Church Year

This year, we focused on Indigenous rights:

- We learned more about Indigenous issues through the eyes of Chelsea Vowel, Metis author, in her book Indigenous Writes.
- JEDI engaged all ages in our social justice activities as part of Spirit Zones, including sending letters to our federal politicians to urge them to move forward on reform of the Indigenous child welfare system.
- We introduced online training with Free to Be (formerly known as Hollaback), on how to become good allies to Indigenous people, Black people and People of Colour (IBPOC).
- We hosted Bruce McIvor, Metis lawyer, Unitarian, historian and author, who spoke about the legal battles being waged to protect Indigenous rights in Canada as described in his book Standoff.
- We collected Outreach contributions for Impact North Shore, RAVEN, and the Residential School Survivor's Society.
- We showed up to several rallies to support the efforts of the Ts'leil Wat'uth, Nuchatlaht and Wet'suwet'en to protect their traditional territories.


