we can teach and things to learn whether we're 8 or 98.





onest ritual. Trusted relationship. Reflective space. Beautiful sound. Earnest justice. Abundant fun.

That is my answer. I wonder what your answer might be. What is the question? Well, before I present it, I'll share how I came to it.

You see, I think we find ourselves in a place where it is both possible

and necessary that we grow our community in the hopes of making an impact - on the world, the particu-

lar lives of those who we reach, and on ourselves as well. And as I was contemplating the mechanics of how we go about doing that, I imagined myself in conversation with an interested someone. What would I tell them? What would I tell them that would pique their interest and illuminate their need?

Of course, this is another way of asking, "what does the world need?" And maybe this is a way of wondering about what it is that I need. At any rate, in this imagined conversation (after much thought — but one can hit the pause button in imagined conversations), I expressed that at NSUC we engage in honest ritual, build trusted relationships, create space for reflection, make beautiful sounds, pursue justice in earnest, and make merry.

So the question is: What is it that we do? What are we for?

And for me, the answer is this: We engage in honest ritual, tapping into the truths of myth and experience in order to reveal our connectedness. We build trusted relationships where we can bring our whole selves and be welcomed and encouraged. We create space for self-reflection and transformation. We make beautiful sounds that saturate our bodies and souls with meaning. And where else do adults gather together to sing anyway? Also, we do our best to do better in the world and to make the world do

better. And we laugh. A lot. We smile and joke with each others up and down the age spec-

trum. We are known.

"WHAT IS IT THAT WE DO?

WHAT ARE WE FOR?"

That sounds good. And it is good. True, it's been hard to make merry of late, what with a pandemic on and other factors. We've yet to have a party. But when I see you together on Sundays, the light in your eyes is there, the joyful smiles and shared confidences. The fun is abundant still. And we will ramp up the scale of it as soon as we are able.

So that is my answer. It's an answer I invite you to consider. It's an answer I welcome you to share, to refine. Maybe it is your answer too. Maybe you have your own answer.

So tell me, what do we do? What are we for? I would love to hear your thoughts. Maybe we can chat about them over lunch (sign up <u>HERE</u> or by contacting the <u>Church</u> <u>Office</u>).

he last few weeks have been a lesson in perspective. After most of a year, **Buildings and Grounds has** a chair again (actually co-chairsthanks Paul Symons and Brian Welwood). The CUC has adopted a new principle for the first time in 35 years. And the term

"atmospheric river" has gone from novel to terrifying to commonplace.

Which of these changes is most impactful depends entirely on perspective. The 8th Principle will have far-reaching effects on Unitarianism, hopefully making us more attractive and

relevant to younger generations. And obviously, climate change is an existential threat, making a strong case to be named the Fifth Horseman of the Apocalypse.

But from a practical standpoint, it's very important to have someone to call when the sewer system is overloaded and the toilets at the church won't flush. Particularly for me, as someone who doesn't want to get those calls.

It probably also says something that the discovery of a new covid variant amounts to little more than a reminder to buy more masks.

The impact of the 8th Principle is as yet unknown. Will it become a defining, coastal principle like number one and number seven, or will it be a flyover principle like numbers two through six?

From the most pragmatic perspective, what it means is that we could really use an Outreach Team. Even just as a statement of intent, the 8th Principle could act as a lighthouse to people who

CUC Adopts 8th Principle

At the Canadian Unitarian Council's Special Meeting on November 27th, Canadian Unitarian Universalists voted to approve adding an 8th Principle to the current seven Principles. The new principle states:

"We, the member congregations of the Canadian Unitarian Council, covenant to affirm and promote: Individual and communal action that accountably dismantles racism and systemic barriers to full inclusion in ourselves and our institutions".

95% of 104 delegates at the Special Meeting voted in favour of the motion.



A Message to the Congregation about the 8th Principle

While some of us felt relief and optimism with the outcome of our congregational vote on the 8th Principle on November 21st, we realize that a number of congregants have concerns about the adoption of this Principle. As Co-Chairs of the Justice, Equity, Diversity and Inclusion Team, we want to assure those members that we have been listening

and we have heard your concerns. You have told us you want an approach to anti-racism that unites us, rather than divides us. You want an approach that does not involve blaming or shaming people who have enjoyed privilege that they may have inherited but did not ask for. You want an approach that continues to welcome diverse views and opinions, in an atmosphere of respect and curiosity, not judgment. As we move forward, the JEDI team will do our best to address these concerns.

For the record, we do not believe in "kicking people out" because their values or beliefs are different from ours. We think that being accountable is making a promise we really try to keep, and helping each other stay on track. Making mistakes is inevitable and will happen for all of us – we will apologize and strive to do better – and begin again in love. Let us all move forward in this spirit.

JEDI Team Updates

Many congregants would like us to focus on Indigenous rights and reconciliation. In November, a Spirit Zone focused on justice for Indigenous children who were apprehended from their families. Our young people taught us about what happened in residential schools, we enjoyed some Bannock, and we wrote to the Prime Minister asking him to halt his appeal of the 2016 decision of the Canadian Human Rights Commission. We pulled together a list of useful resources about this issue which are posted on the JEDI web page.

On November 21st, we introduced free on-line bystander intervention training by Hollaback – to teach us how to be good allies of BIPOC and other marginalized people.

We will be scheduling future events on Indigenous rights, exploring ways to support the efforts of the Tsleil-Waututh Nation to protect Burrard Inlet, and advocating for safe drinking water in Indigenous communities. We hope to offer the Kairos Blanket exercise again, and bring in an Indigenous speaker for at least one Sunday service.




Soul Matters & Circles of Light

Outreach

Each Sunday, 100% of our offering plate collections, unless otherwise marked, are given to the Outreach Recipient. During the summer, we collected \$3,980 for the <u>Indian</u> <u>Residential School Survivors Society</u>. For the Fall months, we collected a total of \$4,407.90 and divided it equally among these registered charities (\$1,469.30 each):

<u>SeedChange (formerly Unitarian Service Committee)</u>, <u>Food Stash Foun-</u> <u>dation</u>, and <u>Quest Food Exchange</u>. In December, we will collect for the <u>Red Cross Flood Relief in BC</u>. In January, we will collect for the Pastoral Discretionary Fund. February is yet to be determined.


Care & Concerns Team

Environmental Action Team's Book & Outreach Selections This Past Fall

Our EA Team kicked off the Rainbow of Reading Book Club this Fall, engaging 40 people in a common read of Elin Kelsey's **Hope Matters: Why Chang***ing the Way We Think is Critical to Solving the Environmental Crisis.* Kelsey will offer an update on her

book as theme speaker at Winter Eliot December 28th to January 1st.

We linked the environmental focus of the Book Club to a campaign to raise awareness about the three non-profits we selected to receive Outreach donations in the Fall Term: SeedChange, Food Stash, and Quest Food Exchange. Barb Kroon researched food waste as a driver of carbon emissions, publishing her findings online in the GreenTips column and on a bulletin board display in the lower hall. Carla Pellegrini of Food Stash spoke to 20 people in an October Spirit Zone, explaining how her organization redirects food that might otherwise be discarded to kitchens feeding needy people.
